..... Frederic Chopin

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Mozart, A Major Sonata: Written during the summer of 1778 in Paris, this is one of his most brilliant and popular works. Lovely themes, varied rhythms, and the rondo "alla turca" give it a wide range of tonal and emotional interest.

Notes

Chopin, B-Flat Minor Sonata: Though it is hardly a sonata, this is one of the grandest piano compositions. The first two sections are noble and well constructed. The third, the "Funeral March," is a spectacular and justly well-known conception. The strange, 80-second, swirling finale has been called a bitter and enigmatic outpouring. Chopin wrote the work from 1837 to 1839.

Schumann, *Carnaval*: To many, this is the cornerstone of the romantic period in music. The program is secondary. As pure music the *Carnaval* is a glowing, nostalgic, and passionate flood from one of the most poetic of all composers. Schumann achieves a bewildering variety despite his limitation to three main themes.

Guiomar Novaes

We are pleased and honored to present Madame Novaes during her farewell tour of the United States. Tonight she plays two of the works which were part of her American debut at Aeolian Hall, New York, in 1915. Besides these Bach and Schumann works, she played Beethoven, Brahms, Chopin and Moszkowski pieces. This event was commemorated fifty years later in her golden jubilee recital in Philharmonic Hall. The familiar masterpieces she plays tonight are works long associated with Madame Novaes through concerts and recordings. After December appearances with the National Symphony Orchestra and in recital in New York, Madame Novaes plans to retire to her native Sao Paulo. Music lovers the world over have been enriched by her art and wish her well.
